The 2024 Legislative Session! Highlights related to the Priorities of the SSDCC

Full funding of the Small District Factor –

School districts in fiscally constrained counties with student populations less than 20,000 will receive an additional calculation of 1.0277 on the districts full-time equivalent (FTE) student membership pursuant to section 1011.62, Florida Statutes.

Special Facility Construction Account Program Funding –

Record funding provided to eight projects - \$234,996,677 (See Chart on Page 9)

<u>Compression of Local Ad valorem and Per Student Funding –</u>

The Discretionary Local Effort was compressed to the Statewide Average

Continuation Funding for School District Personnel Salaries

Each school district and charter school shall use 1.07 percent of its base FEFP funding amount as provided in HB 5001, to either (a) increase the minimum base salary reported on the school district's or charter school's performance salary schedule, as defined in section 1012.22(1)(c), Florida Statutes, to at least \$47,500 or the maximum amount achievable based on the amount the 1.07 percent generates, or (b) to provide salary increases to other full-time instructional personnel as defined in section 1012.01(2), Florida Statutes. If a school district or charter school uses all or a portion of its funds to increase the minimum base salary, no eligible full-time classroom teacher or eligible certified prekindergarten teacher shall receive a minimum base salary less than the adjusted amount.

<u>Sovereign Immunity Limits</u> – No changes to S.I. limits

Support for Local Elected Officials -

Salary formula for Elected Superintendents was modified to provide salary increase.

Local Flexibility - Cost Per Student Station

An unfinished construction project for new construction of educational plant space that was started on or before July 1, 2028, is exempt from the total cost per student station requirements

Regional Consortia Service Program Funding – fully funded

Safe Schools funding was increased by \$40 million

Funding for Safe Schools Canine Program in Fiscally Constrained Counties

\$3.5 million funds are provided for grants to schools in fiscally constrained counties for participation in the Florida Safe Schools Canine Program pursuant to section 1006.121, Florida Statutes. Funds may be used for the purchase, training, or caring for a firearm detection canine and other costs associated with participation in the program.

Funding for School Transportation increased by \$20.7 million

Mental Health Funding - was increased by \$20 million

General Appropriations Act; Provides moneys for annual period beginning July 1, 2024, & ending June 30, 2025, & supplemental appropriations for period ending June 30, 2024, to pay salaries & other expenses, capital outlay—buildings & other improvements, & for other specified purposes of various agencies of state government. APPROPRIATION: \$117,463,274,374

HB 5003 — Implementing the 2024-2025 General Appropriations Act
The bill provides one-year provisions necessary to implement the GAA

HB 5101: Implementing Bill for Education

Education; Providing for the initial open enrollment period for specified employees; providing requirements for the minimum participation period for specified institutions; requiring charter schools to report full-time equivalent student membership rather than student enrollments for funding purposes; providing that funding for students enrolled in charter schools sponsored by state universities or Florida College System institutions is provided in the Florida Education Finance Program and General Appropriations Act; etc. APPROPRIATION: \$250,000,000

HB 151 — Florida Retirement System

The bill establishes the contribution rates paid by employers that participate in the Florida Retirement System (FRS) beginning July 1, 2024. These rates are intended to fund the full normal cost and the amortization of the unfunded actuarial liability of the FRS and the impact of changes made by the bill. The 3 percent **employee** contribution rate is not changed by this bill. The bill authorizes an FRS retiree to be reemployed with an employer participating in the FRS and receive both compensation and retirement benefits, after meeting the definition of termination. This effectively eliminates the "suspension of benefits" period typically applied during months 7 through 12 after the date of retirement.

The bill also closes the FRS Preservation of Benefits Plan to new members effective July 1, 2026. The Preservation of Benefits Plan currently provides for FRS members to be eligible to receive a benefit that is in excess of the annual benefit limit established by the Internal Revenue Service. Effective July 1, 2024, the limitation on an annual benefit under a defined benefit plan is \$275,000.

SPECIAL FACILITY CONSTRUCTION ACCOUNT FUNDING

Funding Levels for the Special Facility Construction Program.

- In 2024-25, the Legislature provided \$234,996,677 \$193,182,160 to fund the second of two years for three projects listed and the first year funding for two new projects. In addition, \$41,814,517 was funded to three projects to address inflationary cost increases.
- In 2023-24, the Legislature provided \$88,590,239 to fund the first of two years for three projects listed.
- In 2022-23, the Legislature provided \$64,445,244 to complete the projects previously funded.
- In 2021-22, the Legislature provided \$210,000,000 for recommended projects.
- In 2020-21, the Florida Legislature provided \$41,304,151 for recommended projects.
- In 2019-20, the Florida Legislature provided \$32,326,046 for recommended projects.
- In 2018-19, the Florida Legislature provided \$33,392,727 for recommended projects.
- In 2017-18 the Legislature provided \$57,049,600 for recommended projects, however, \$6,237,330 was vetoed for being funded out of order of the recommended priority list.
- In 2016-17, the Legislature provided \$75,370,357 for recommended projects.
- In 2015-16, the Legislature provided \$89,761,931 for recommended projects.
- In 2014-15, the Legislature provided \$59,686,264 for recommended projects.
- In 2013-14, the Legislature provided \$7,870,913 for recommended projects.

programs; deleting a requirement that school districts provide certain virtual instruction options to students; deleting a requirement regarding assessment procedures for Department of Juvenile Justice education programs; providing requirements for students in the Voluntary Prekindergarten Education Program who exhibit a substantial deficiency in early literacy skills and early mathematics skills, etc. Effective Date: 7/1/2024

SB 7014 Ethics by Ethics and Elections

Ethics; Increasing the maximum fine for violations of specified lobbying provisions; authorizing attorneys who file full and public disclosures of their financial interests to indicate that a client meets disclosure criteria without providing further information relating to such client; prohibiting a member of the Commission on Ethics from serving more than two full terms, instead of two full terms in succession; providing that a complainant is liable for costs plus reasonable attorney fees for filing a complaint with malicious intent against a candidate for public office; requiring that allegations in written complaints submitted to the commission be based upon personal knowledge or information other than hearsay, etc. Effective Date: Except as otherwise expressly provided in this act, this act shall take effect upon becoming a law

SB 7016 Health Care by Health Policy

Health Care; Revising the purpose of the Dental Student Loan Repayment Program; requiring the Department of Health to implement the Dr. and Mrs. Alfonse and Kathleen Cinotti Health Care Screening and Services Grant Program for a specified purpose; providing requirements for birth centers designated as advanced birth centers with respect to operating procedures, staffing, and equipment; requiring advanced birth centers to enter into a written agreement with a blood bank for emergency blood bank services; authorizing certain psychiatric nurses to order emergency treatment of certain patients; creating the Training, Education, and Clinicals in Health (TEACH) Funding Program for a specified purpose; enacting the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact in this state, etc. APPROPRIATION: \$717,105,294 Effective Date: except as otherwise provided

HB 7017 Annual Adjustment to Homestead Exemption Value by Ways & Means Committee

Annual Adjustment to Homestead Exemption Value: Proposes amendment to State Constitution to require an annual adjustment for inflation to the value of current or future homestead exemptions that apply solely to levies other than school district levies & for which every person who has legal or equitable title to real estate and maintains thereon the permanent residence of the owner, or another person legally or naturally dependent upon the owner is eligible.

HB 7019 Exemption of Homesteads by Ways & Means Committee

Exemption of Homesteads: Requires value of homestead exemption be adjusted annually; requiring Legislature appropriate funds for specified purpose; require funds be distributed in specified manner; requires specified counties provide certain documentation.
